- **0% Corporate & Personal Income Tax.** Texas imposes no corporate & personal income tax
- Low Corporate Franchise Tax. Texas' corporate franchise (margins) tax is among the lowest in the country, at 2% or below
- Right-to-Work State. Texas is a right-to-work state with a largely non-unionized workforce. Both Texas and Fort Worth maintain minimal union presence
- Labor Cost Efficiency. Texas combines competitive labor costs with pro-employer labor laws that keep compliance burdens low and hiring practices flexible
- Business-Friendly. Texas has one of America's most business-friendly regulatory atmospheres






DFW POPULATION GROWTH IN MILLIONS





ADVANCED MANUFACTURING FORT WORTH BUILT





Cutting-Edge Production. Fort Worth is leading the way in advanced manufacturing, with companies spearheading next-generation projects from MP Materials' production of rare earth magnets to Siemens' state-of-the-art tech manufacturing facility.



Manufacturing Workforce Power. The strength of the DFW advanced manufacturing sector is driven by a workforce of more than 300,000. While the U.S. saw a 0.1% decline in manufacturing employment in 2024, the DFW manufacturing labor pool grew by 2.8%, outpacing national trends.



R&D Growth in Fort Worth. With a central U.S. location, multimodal access, and a pro-business environment, Fort Worth connects advanced manufacturers to key markets and fuels innovation through lower operating costs, strong public-private partnerships, and expanding R&D investment.

AEROSPACE & DEFENCE INNOVATION IN FLIGHT





Established Industry Hub. The Fort Worth region is one of the leading aerospace & defense hubs in North America with more than 600 aerospace and defense companies anchored by Bell and Lockheed Martin and a robust cluster of defense-related startups.



Skilled Workforce. With more than 23,000 aerospace and defense workers and a steady talent pipeline from both universities and specialized training programs at local community colleges, Fort Worth offers a workforce ready to meet industry demands.



Innovative Ecosystem. Fort Worth's aerospace sector is supported by Texas' top-ranked education network and more than \$250M in federal aerospace R&D. The new Texas A&M Center for Advanced Aviation Technologies further positions the city as a hub for innovation and workforce development.

Diverse Energy Ecosystem. Fort Worth is fueling the future of energy, from oil and gas to renewables, battery tech, and energy-focused IoT. With roots in the Barnett Shale and innovators like Harnyss and its solid-state hydrogen storage, the city supports a strong, diversified energy sector.



Pro-Business Location for Energy Growth. Positioned in the heart of Texas, Fort Worth offers unmatched advantages for energy companies, including a strategic central location, no state income tax, and a cost-competitive business environment built to support innovation and expansion.



#1 State for Energy Leadership. Texas leads in natural gas, electricity, wind, biodiesel, and solar. With nearly 1 million energy workers representing 15 percent of the U.S. total, Fort Worth provides direct access to one of the deepest and most skilled energy talent pools in the country.

Film-Friendly City. Since launching the Fort Worth Film Commission in 2015, the city has become a go-to destination for film, television, and commercial productions—offering hands-on support, diverse locations, and a film-friendly environment.




Fast-Track Talent Pipeline. The Fort Worth Film Collaborative—a partnership between the Film Commission, Tarrant County College, and 101 Studios—is fast-tracking local talent into the industry with cutting-edge training programs that are meeting the rising demand for skilled crew across the region.



Cost-Competitive Talent Hub: DFW financial services workforce ranks second in the nation, trailing only New York; but Fort Worth companies enjoy operating costs 20 to 50% lower than traditional coastal hubs—offering a competitive location without sacrificing talent or market access.

LIFE SCIENCE & BIO TECH BUILDING MOMENTUM





Emerging Life Science Hub. Fort Worth is at the center of an emerging life sciences industry, with global leaders like Alcon, established medtech companies like Urgo Medical, and innovative startups like Panthera Bio Solutions, driving growth and innovation.



Medical Innovation District. Just south of downtown, Fort Worth's 1,200-acre district is driving private-sector growth and emerging as a hub for medical R&D. Anchored the Burnett School of Medicine at TCU, UNT Health Science Center, and the new Texas A&M campus, the district blends research, education, and workforce development to advance medicine and medtech.



Texas Powers Life Science. The Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health (ARPA-H) selected a Texas consortium for one of its three national hubs—with a customer experience hub based in DFW—strengthening Fort Worth's role as a growing center for health innovation and biotech investment.




